


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From the Executive Producer

here are different kinds of delight we experience at live theater. Two kinds of delight have stood out to me as we begin the 2024-2025 season at RVP. One is seeing the positive impact live theater has on our lives. Grandparents, parents, siblings, children and friends come to The Barn to see loved ones perform. They witness not-often-seen qualities in the performances.

Director's Notes

My late mother-in-law, Dana, drew me to *Blithe Spirit*. When it came time to choose a show for RVP, my dazzling wife, theatre artist Zoë Swenson-Graham, had just given birth to our first child. The unrealizable desire to share that joy with Dana was in the air when Zoë jokingly quoted her late

mother, "Why don't you do something fun, like Blithe Spirit? People like to laugh!"

It's easy to dismiss a comedy as mere entertainment, and I have found the desire to do something meaningful or "important" can sometimes turn out to be a blind spot. After working on *The Glass Menagerie* last year, new fatherhood and a world climate

of conflict and many challenges facing us, I loved the idea of doing a comedy. Blithe Spirit premiered in 1941 during World War II and closed in 1946 after the war had ended. This play ran for almost 2,000 performances in London, setting a new record for a nonmusical. Noel Coward wrote Blithe Spirit from Wales shortly after his London flat and office were destroyed in the Blitz by

bombs dropped by the German Air Force.
I believe Coward tapped into something

of real use for his audiences of that time. In order for a comedy to succeed in circumstances like that, I think it must speak to something of the human condition. Following that thought, our production has drawn from many comedic traditions, not

necessarily intuitive for a British farce, and changed the setting from the 1930s to the 1950s. It seems to me that it may be necessary to laugh at the worst parts of ourselves in order to appeal to the "better angels of our nature". I hope our production makes these things available to our audiences of 2024.

We may not be able to achieve a lasting world peace

with this production, but spending our time together watching a play as our planet hurtles through space is a mad and beautiful thing. Beyond that, this play is for Dana, Zoë, and all the people who would love a good haunt from those they miss.

Lizzy Bies (*Edith*) was last seen on the RVP stage as Millie Owens in *Picnic*, a role which earned them a nomination for Best Supporting Actor at the San Francisco Bay Area Theatre Critics Circle. Lizzy recently graduated with an Acting Certificate from Santa Rosa Junior College, where they performed as the title character in *Orlando*. Sophie Gilmore (Stage Manager) is excited to take part in Blithe Spirit, her first show with Ross Valley Players. She also dabbles in operatic stage management, working with San Diego Opera in their rendition of Madama Butterfly and their upcoming productions of Salome and La traviata. To round out her days, she works as a Guest Artist at Tamalpais High School, mentoring students in production and stage management in hopes of inspiring young artists to pursue their career goals.

Piper Gilmore (Cook/Assistant Stage Manager) plays the cook and serves as the Assistant Stage Manager for Blithe Spirit. She has experience working on shows at College of Marin and is very excited to assist in her first RVP production.

Frank Sarubbi (Lighting Design). Blithe Spirit marks Frank's 13th lighting assignment for RVP. Frank acquired his love for lighting design in 1966 in Mr. Witt's drama class at San Francisco's Lincoln High School, Frank won the 2012 SFBATCC lighting design award for NTC's production of Noises Off. In 2014, Frank was nominated again for lighting Marin On Stage & Curtain Theater's production of Return to the Forbidden Planet which won Best Entire Production from SFBATCC. In 2015, he was nominated for NTC's Into the Woods. 2016 brought another nomination for lighting design for NTC's production of 4000 Miles. In 2023, he won SFBATCC lighting design award for the Ross

Valley Players' production of *Native Gardens*. It's been a pleasure working with this cast and crew of *Blithe Spirit*.

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
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
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
